
* STAR LIGHT * STAR BRIGHT *

MEET THE HOLTS

Perched at the end of Greywolf Road overlooking both the mountains and the strait stands the home of Jack and Nancy Holt, the very first residents of the Blue Ribbon Farms development.

The Holts were born and raised in southern California, Jack in Los Angeles and Nancy in Pasadena. Jack served in the United States Coast Guard both in Korea and the USA. He and Nancy were married in 1954 and shortly thereafter moved to Eureka, CA where Jack was stationed. It was on a beautiful spring day while traveling through the strait with the USCG that Jack's attention was first drawn to the Sequim coastline. After finishing his tour, Jack and Nancy moved back to southern California where Jack started his thirty-year career as a deputy with the LA County Sheriff's Department. Nancy worked part-time for Sears but focused her efforts on making a home for



their three sons. The Holts enjoyed camping and made yearly trips to the Sequim area in the early 1980s.

In 1984 Jack retired and they purchased their home on Greywolf, which was under construction as a spec house for the newly established Blue Ribbon Farms development. On September 4, 1984 they became our first official residents. It would be another year and a half before they would have any neighbors.

Many changes have occurred in the area over the last 16 years. Once, grassy fields were the dominant scenery...only the airstrip and the Holt's property were mowed. They could walk the entire way along the bluff to the park. There were two pretty large grass fires in those early years. Over the course of the first eight years a few homes appeared. As building steadily increased progress brought some welcome changes: the roads were paved, the mail was delivered to their driveway box instead of a half a mile down the road, younger families with children moved in and bald eagle sightings became a regular occurrence. Even with all the changes though, the neighborhood still remains free of serious crime.

Jack and Nancy are enjoying retirement. Nancy has fashioned some beautiful quilting projects. Jack spends time in his garage with woodworking and carving. They have their three sons and four grandchildren spread between Redding, CA, Kalispell, MT and Fall City, WA. They have recently purchased a new fifth-wheel RV and are planning an extended trip to the east coast, especially New England and New York. They have done a lot of experimenting with landscaping, finding ways to live with the winds that, as we all know, can kick up along the strait. In fact, they once witnessed a newly framed house on Greywolf blown entirely away in a storm!

There are countless more stories the Holts can tell of life in Blue Ribbon Farms. A visit with these friendly folks will provide lots of chuckles and a good local history lesson.
